# Pledge Total Tops Number Of Last Year

The recent IFC ruling barring the pledging of freshman men on scholastic probation proved to have no harmful effect on the number of men signing bids at the end of this year's formal rushing period Saturday morning.

The University's 53 fraternities took in a total of 901 pledges, an increase of about 50 men over the totals for each of the past two years. This figure was attained in spite of the fact that 289 freshmen became ineligible to pledge as a result of the new rule.

The 15 sororities, which completed their formal rushing period Saturday night, accepted 254 pledges, for an average of 16.9 per house.

The original list of freshmen on academic probation, which was released to the houses Thursday, showed 319 men ineligible for further rushing. This total was reduced to 289, as a result of mechanical errors, changes in grades and other factors which were subsequently corrected.

According to Charles E. Warwick, Assistant Dean of Students and advisor to the fraternity system, as many as 40 freshmen may get off the probation list as a result of appeals and other fact-

ors. This means that the final percentage of men on probation will be about 15 per cent, the same as last year.

The probation list was to have been available to the houses last Monday. However, the heavy snowfall over the weekend disrupted the normal process of entering final grades. According to Richard A. Stein '61, IFC vice-president, this delay will have a considerable effect upon the status of freshmen on probation. Had the list been published Monday, freshmen would not yet have selected a house at the time they were declared ineligible. Instead, many freshmen had decided to join a particular fraternity when the list was finally released.

Stein said that the house presidents will meet shortly to determine the status of men on probation with respect to further rushing. The alternatives appear to be to allow bids to be given out as soon as these men are removed from the probationary list in the fall, or to require another rushing period in the fall.

Although houses were not allowed to bid men on probation, many freshmen were invited to Friday night dinners by the houses, which is generally consid-

ered the equivalent of a bid.

The house presidents will also have to decide whether or not these ineligible men who have selected a fraternity may make living arrangements in the houses for the fall term while they are still on probation, according to Stein.

The record snowstorm forced the IFC to eliminate an entire day from the rushing calendar. Smokers on Saturday, Feb. 4, were re-scheduled on Sunday and Monday. Dates for the Monday smoker were not allowed to be broken, even though a contact period intervened. This placed many freshmen at a disadvantage, since they saw a house for the first time Monday. Dormitory counsellors, in general, had advised the freshmen to see as many houses as possible during the eight smokers, but to narrow down their choices by the beginning of the week of rushing meals.

The fraternities as a whole accepted an average of 17 pledges. Houses of predominantly Jewish membership took in an average of 28.4 pledges, while predominantly Christian fraternities accepted an average of 14.3 pledges.

Stein noted that the number of rushing violations was about the same as usual.
